PAST AND FUTURE TENSES

The past tense (aorist) form $\pi i \Sigma T E \Psi A$ expresses belief held at a previous time, while the future tense ΘA $\pi i \Sigma T E \Psi A$ indicates belief that will occur or be held in the future. These variations allow nuanced communication about belief across different temporal contexts.

SUBJUNCTIVE AND IMPERATIVE MOODS

The subjunctive mood in Greek is used to express wishes, doubts, or possibilities related to belief, while the imperative mood can be used in commands or encouragements to believe. For instance, π is the imperative form meaning "believe!"
