HISTORY AND MISSION OF THE BERKELEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY & MUSEUM

THE BERKELEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY & MUSEUM WAS ESTABLISHED TO PRESERVE AND PROMOTE THE HISTORICAL LEGACY OF BERKELEY AND THE SURROUNDING EAST BAY REGION. FOUNDED BY LOCAL HISTORIANS AND COMMUNITY LEADERS, THE INSTITUTION AIMS TO COLLECT, DOCUMENT, AND INTERPRET SIGNIFICANT ARTIFACTS AND RECORDS THAT REFLECT BERKELEY'S DEVELOPMENT OVER THE CENTURIES. THE SOCIETY OPERATES WITH A MISSION TO EDUCATE THE PUBLIC ABOUT THE CITY'S DIVERSE CULTURAL, SOCIAL, AND POLITICAL HISTORY THROUGH EXHIBITS, PUBLICATIONS, AND EVENTS.

FOUNDING AND DEVELOPMENT

ORIGINATING IN THE MID-20TH CENTURY, THE BERKELEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY & MUSEUM WAS CREATED IN RESPONSE TO THE GROWING NEED FOR A DEDICATED ORGANIZATION TO SAFEGUARD BERKELEY'S HISTORICAL MATERIALS. OVER TIME, IT EXPANDED ITS SCOPE AND FACILITIES TO ACCOMMODATE AN EVER-GROWING COLLECTION OF ARCHIVAL MATERIALS, PHOTOGRAPHS, ORAL HISTORIES, AND MEMORABILIA. THE MUSEUM'S DEVELOPMENT REFLECTS ONGOING COMMUNITY SUPPORT AND A SHARED COMMITMENT TO PRESERVING BERKELEY'S HERITAGE.

CORE MISSION AND VALUES

PERMANENT COLLECTIONS

THE PERMANENT COLLECTIONS FOCUS ON KEY THEMES SUCH AS BERKELEY'S FOUNDING, URBAN DEVELOPMENT, ACADEMIC INSTITUTIONS, SOCIAL MOVEMENTS, AND CULTURAL MILESTONES. ITEMS INCLUDE EARLY SETTLER ARTIFACTS, ARCHITECTURAL BLUEPRINTS, VINTAGE PHOTOGRAPHS, AND MEMORABILIA FROM SIGNIFICANT LOCAL EVENTS. THESE PIECES PROVIDE A TANGIBLE CONNECTION TO BERKELEY'S EVOLUTION THROUGH TIME.

SPECIAL EXHIBITIONS
