POWER DISTANCE

POWER DISTANCE REFERS TO THE EXTENT TO WHICH LESS POWERFUL MEMBERS OF A SOCIETY ACCEPT AND EXPECT POWER TO BE DISTRIBUTED UNEQUALLY. UNCERTAINTY AVOIDANCE

UNCERTAINTY AVOIDANCE REFLECTS HOW COMFORTABLE A CULTURE IS WITH AMBIGUITY AND UNCERTAINTY. CROSS CULTURAL RESEARCH FINDINGS INDICATE THAT CULTURES WITH HIGH UNCERTAINTY AVOIDANCE PREFER CLEAR RULES, FORMAL PROCEDURES, AND PREDICTABILITY, WHEREAS THOSE WITH LOW UNCERTAINTY AVOIDANCE ARE MORE TOLERANT OF AMBIGUITY AND RISK-

TAKING.

OTHER NOTABLE DIMENSIONS

ADDITIONAL CULTURAL DIMENSIONS IDENTIFIED THROUGH CROSS CULTURAL RESEARCH FINDINGS INDICATE THAT LONG-TERM VERSUS SHORT-TERM ORIENTATION, INDULGENCE VERSUS RESTRAINT, AND MASCULINITY VERSUS FEMININITY ALSO SHAPE CULTURAL NORMS AND BEHAVIORS. COMMUNICATION STYLES ACROSS CULTURES
