Furthermore, gender and sexual attraction were not associated with diagnosis; yet, symptoms did. There were also interaction effects between client gender and symptom presentation on diagnosis. If our results persist with increased sample size, we would recommend increasing training, in graduate school and through continuing education units, on the variety of ways an individual may express SO concerns. Additional exploratory results and further implications of results are discussed.
