Lee High School in Montgomery, Alabama, after being forced to leave his beloved Booker T. Washington Yellow Jackets. *The Atlanta Journal-Constitution* examined what it was like for Ralph to be the only African American member at the prestigious Atlanta Country Club for 7 years, and why it was so important for Ralph to challenge segregation in the world of golf. *AL.com* briefly highlighted how Ralph stood up to racist policies at the University of Alabama during his time there as a football player. Now there is a book that tells the whole story. In *One of the First*, you'll read detailed accounts of those parts of Ralph's story, but you'll also read how: ***Ralph grew up being inspired by other African American pioneers, with his dad owning a negro league baseball team and his family being founding members of the church

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
