One of the primary goals of the McKinney-Vento Act is to minimize educational disruption for students facing homelessness. This includes specific enrollment rights and protections to ensure immediate access to education without unnecessary barriers.

## **Can Homeless Students Enroll Without Proof of Residency or Immunizations?**

Yes. Under McKinney-Vento, homeless students must be enrolled immediately even if they lack typical documents such as proof of residency, immunization records, or previous school records. Schools are required to assist in obtaining necessary documentation promptly.

## **What Are the Rights Regarding School Stability?**

Students experiencing homelessness have the right to:

- Continue attending their school of origin—the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled—if it is in their best interest
- Enroll immediately in the local school if that is preferred or more practical
- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin if requested

These provisions help maintain continuity in education and social connections.

## **Transportation Provisions under McKinney-Vento**

Access to reliable transportation is a significant barrier for many homeless students. The McKinney-Vento Act mandates transportation support to ensure students can attend school consistently.

## **Who is Responsible for Providing Transportation?**

If informal resolution fails, families have the right to:

1. Receive a written explanation of the school's decision
2. Appeal the decision to the local educational agency
3. Access mediation or due process hearings as provided by state law

Throughout the process, the student must be immediately enrolled and allowed to attend the school of choice pending resolution.

Beyond enrollment and transportation, McKinney-Vento provides access to a broad range of support services aimed at reducing barriers to educational success for homeless students.
