He believed that it was an event that led to self-confidence and self-control in a child, breeding greater freedom and the ability to do things on their own. Autonomy Vs Shame and Doubt In order to achieve this autonomy in children, it is important that parents let the children do

things on their own. This means not being too overprotective and certainly not shaming the child whenever there was a mistake. The result of the way you react to your child during this stage has a great significance on the child's world view later on. Whether your child goes on to become a confident and self-assured person or views the world through a lens of shame and doubt about his or abilities will depend a lot on the way you handle things during the potty training stage. Not to put pressure on you as a parent, this is merely a call for lots of patience during the toilet training phase.
